- Education information
 - This includes basic educational information, such as
 - College(s) or university/universities attended, and degrees / certifications awarded
 - This may be covered by the c.v., above.
- Information about your career
 - AIA registration (year). If it is in progress, please explain.
 - Information about professional certifications attained (name, year)
 - Professional awards (name, year)
 - Professional projects that you would like to mention.
 - This may be covered in the c.v. above
- If you are able to provide then, please provide digital photographs for some of your most meaningful projects. If these images require the permission of a firm to use, and you cannot provide that permission, please provide contact information so that we may contact that person/firm and make the request.
- If you are able to provide photographs of yourself, it would be greatly appreciated. This could include photographs of you from multiple times during your career.
